What has been achieved so far?

The St. George Neighbourhood Partnership was formed in November 2007. At the first public meeting the following were identified by the community as their highest priorities:

- To extend Speedwell's very small Meadow Vale Community Centre.
- To involve young people in Troopers Hill Local Nature Reserve.
- To publish a Partnership Newsletter
- To reinstate trees in Kensington Rd.
- To tackle rubbish dumping in the public footpath in Kensington Rd.

Since this meeting the **Partnership has:**

Supported the members of Meadow Vale Community Association with their application for funding from the People's

Via their contacts with Friends of Troopers Hill, involved candidates from the Duke of Edinburgh's Award in building steps and recovering an overgrown path linking Troopers Hill and Troopers Hill field.

Through Friends of Troopers Hill assisted local children to learn about the history and wildlife of Troopers Hill. They used their performance and recycling skills to present a very successful "Trooping the Hill" event. This was funded by a grant from Awards for All, and supported by Bristol Parks' Local Nature Reserves Officer, Sally Oldfield.

- Published a Newsletter to promote the Partnership and the work being done to tackle the identified areas of concern. The first issue is this one you are reading and we plan to produce it quarterly.
- Supported the residents group in Kensington Road in their efforts to have trees replaced and get more trees planted in their area.

In August 2008, the Partnership held a second public meeting. At the meeting members of the community identified the following issues that they wanted the Partnership to focus on:

- Increase the police presence and action in the Speedwell area to tackle a rise in anti-social behaviour.
- Improve opportunities & facilities for young people in the Speedwell area.
- Traffic calming in Meadow Vale, Whiteway Rd and Speedwell Rd
- Fly tipping at Speedwell Road, Ventnor Road, Cossham Road, Church Road, Beaufort Road, St George's park and Kensington Road, and last but not least
- Dog fouling

Since this second meeting the Partnership has initiated the following actions:

The Neighbourhood Policing team based at Fishponds have worked with the community in Speedwell and Safer Bristol to devise a range of measures to tackle an increase in anti - social behaviour. Some of the measures are as follows:

- The Highways department are to conduct A dispersal zone has been implemented a site survey in the Meadow Vale, in the area, with extra police patrols. Any Whiteway Rd and Speedwell Rd areas. group identified as causing or likely to cause anti-social behaviour can be ordered Need support! to leave the area for 24 hours or face arrest We are always looking for ways to en-/ prosecution.
- Issued letters informing parents that their children has been acting in anti-social manner and provide help and guidance over the dangers of under age drinking.
- To conduct a crime reduction in the area.
- To work with local premises and trading standards over the selling of alcohol to young people. To encourage shops mark any alcohol sold from their shop and to challenge anyone appearing under 21 years old buying alcohol.

- Continue to work closely with Bristol City Council and Housing Association, housing officers to address any anti-social behaviour from their tenants.
- The Partnership is working with local community groups & Bristol Brunel academy to improve the range of activities available for young people.
- Arranged for graffiti in the area to be removed.
- Arranged for a mobile alcohol education vehicle to attend the area and distribute information and advice about the dangers of alcohol and under-age drinking.
- Bristol City Council and local community representatives have collaborated to stage a community fun day at Meadow Vale. Young people have been asked about the leisure activities they would like to have in their area. The Partnership is keen to work with all stake holders to improve the range of activities available for young people in the area.
- Friends of Troopers Hill held a Fun Dog Show on Sunday 12th October. The local Dog Warden team supported this. Dog owner's responsibilities were highlighted during this event.

attitudes also needed to change in some areas that the Council manages its ways of working. We are able to meet Councillors and Officers and influence the way decisions are made. We ask for funds to be set aside to make the improvements happen, and keep an eye on how the work progresses, so we are 'watchdogs' for the area.

It's not all about asking for more money. Often, a short discussion or phone call is all that is needed to put things right. Currently, we have a very small budget that is available to the Partnership, and I hope that more funds will be made available as we develop.

We now feel that we can challenge those who make decisions on our behalf. Our steering group is made up of a group of volunteers. We hold regular meetings with a variety of support agencies. We want to see St. George become an even better place in which to live, work and relax. We listen to what local people are saying, and then we do our very best to support them and quickly respond to their concerns, and sort out the problems or issues as rapidly as possible.

have lived here since 1949, and I feel that Bristol City Council has overlooked parts of St. George. Until recently, it was probably seen as an area requiring little or no attention, probably because it did not meet with certain criteria in order to trigger cash grants.

Sadly, this has resulted in some areas of St. George looking neglected, run down, tired and forgotten. Things are now beginning to change and improve, but there is still a lot of work to do. I hope that our group will continue to play a significant role in this.

By working together we will be able to make some major improvements to St. George, and begin to put things right.

What is a Neighbourhood Partnership?

The St. George Neighbourhood Partnership is a group made up of local residents, Police, Bristol City Council, local Councillors, community & voluntary organisations. Representatives from this group make St George Neighbourhood Partnership steering group. The steering group meet on regular bases and is responsible for managing the partnership.

The Partnership provides an opportunity for residents, community & voluntary organisations to influence the way that services are delivered locally. We find out what sort of issues residents would like to see improved or changed in the St. George area. This then forms the St George Neighbourhood Partnership Action Plan.

The steering group takes ownership of the Action Plan and ensures that identified priorities are addresssed by the responsible agency.

What area does St George Neighbourhood Partnership cover?

The two council wards of St George East and St George West are covered by the Partnership. This is the area bounded by Conham Rd, starting at the boundary with South Gloucestershire, Crews Hole, Netham Rd, Lypiatt Rd, Whitehall Rd, Speedwell Rd, Ingleside Rd, Soundwell Rd, Cross St and then follows the South Gloucestershire boundary across Magpie Bottom and down to Conham Rd again.

Grenville says "Let's work together to get St.George back on the map!" I was born, raised and educated in St. George,

and have lived in this area for almost sixty years. I am very passionate about this part of Bristol because it is an interesting area of the city to live in, and I want to see improvements and

When I first joined the Partnership I didn't really expect it to be successful.

I thought it would become a political platform for the benefit of Councillors and Council officers, or just be a 'talking shop,' and our influences would be minimal.
