
ABC of Troopers Hill

R is for Reptiles - a class of cold-blooded animals with scaly skin, including snakes and lizards. Two species of lizard live on Troopers Hill: the Common Lizard (Zootoca vivipara) and the Slow Worm (Anguis fragilis).

Both creatures will typically bask in the sun's rays to raise their temperature. The Common Lizard has four short legs, but Slow-Worms have no visible legs and they resemble snakes, from which they can be distinguished by having eyelids and ear openings (snakes have none) and their tongues, which have a notched end rather than a snake-like fork. The Common Lizard may be found in a wide range of habitats from heaths and woods to ditches, hedgerows and gardens. The Slow-Worm inhabits moist grassy areas with scrub including wild gardens, open woodland and wasteland. Garden-dwelling Slow-Worms seem to favour the darkness and warmth of the compost heap (including your Editor's !). The Common Lizard and the Slow-Worm hibernate in winter, and both give birth to live young. The Common Lizard's offspring number between 3 and 10 and are usually born in July.

Slow-Worms produce between 3 and 26 very small offspring, usually in August/September. Lizards can often shed their tails to distract predators;

the discarded section carries on moving after it has been detached allowing the lizard to escape. The tail regrows, but rarely to its
