

# TROOPERS HILL NEEDS YOU

Wednesday, 7th December sees our second AGM. It marks two years since Friends of Troopers Hill was formed and during that time we have organised Dawn Chorus walks, Bat and Moth hunts, History Days, Family Fun Picnics, a Flowering Plant walk and walks for visitors from other groups. We have also repaired fences and gates, put up new signs, cut back brambles to encourage the broom, litter picked, repaired steps, cut bracken (many times) and removed unwanted Holm Oak. In the next year we also hope to organise more walks and family events including a local dog show, a concert on the Hill and family picnics.

We distribute our Newsletter to nearly 300 families. All our activities are free of charge to anyone who cares to attend. We have no formal membership but all of you who receive this Newsletter are members by virtue of your interest in the Hill. To date all of this has been made possible by a small band of less than 20 regular volunteers. If we are to continue the work, we BADLY NEED MORE SUPPORT. Spreading the load among more people means no ongoing commitment from volunteers and the demand on each individual is lighter. All we need is 2 hours of your time -2 hours to attend a work party OR 2 hours to attend one of our regular meetings. So, how about it readers? Those of you who can see the Hill from your windows might well have been astonished to see a stalwart band of Friends struggling against the torrential rain and wind to set up gazebos for our Family Fun Picnic on 13<sup>th</sup>. August! The unfortunate weather may have dampened our clothes and boots but not our enthusiasm for the event which was timed to coincide with the Balloon Fiesta. As we had expected, the rain did in fact stop in time for the event itself, which was well attended. especially considering the circumstances. A crowd of adults and children enjoyed fascinating stories involving dragons" "fire and manv creatures that live on Troopers Hill. International story teller Cassandra kept everyone involved and warm with the actions and sounds of the

various animals we had to imitate. Later on over 50 balloons were released from the top of the Hill as the first ever Troopers Hill Balloon race got under way. The winning balloon was sponsored by George Melksham and the balloon's card was returned by Oliver Martin from Hampton in Middlesex. An incredible distance of 113 miles!

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## WALK THE WALK

Friends are currently working on producing a laminated sheet that will guide you around a circular walk. The sheets will cost £1 each and will take in Troopers Hill, the river, Conham Vale and a new walk at Dundridge Park. Known as the Deer Path, the top entrance to their new walk is off the steps down into the Vale. Using the old stone gatepost as a marker, its route goes past an old pond that should eventually be restored for wildlife. It then passes near the old quarry and the bottom end comes out onto Lower Conham Vale just above the cottages. Signposts will soon be erected to help guide walkers.

#### **HILL HISTORY**

Thanks to Bristol East Allotments Association for the loan of their Pavilion on Saturday  $17^{\text{th}}$ September. A very successful exhibition of documents, maps, objects and photos attracted a wide range of people and more donations to our records. Thank you to those of you who brought photos for scanning, their memories for recording and a wonderful book on the history of Butlers Tar Works. We do apologise for not including this event in our last newsletter. If you missed the exhibition some of these items will be on display at our AGM and we will hold a similar event next year.

Those designs can then be used, if you wish, for applying for grants. N.B. There is NO funding currently available from Bristol Parks to replace the play area.
